

New Humanity NGO - A Proposal for COP30

Towards a just, relational and regenerative transition

We propose an integrated approach to sustainability that harmonizes people, the environment and spirituality, drawing on expertise in eight key dimensions of human life: Economy and Work, Interculturality and Dialogue, Peace and Human Rights, Health, Sport and Ecology, Art and Social Engagement, Education and Research, Communication and Media, Active Citizenship and Politics.

This transdisciplinary approach envisions a new future for the human family and our common home, inspiring collective action for a more united and sustainable world.

Here are our proposals:

1. International Transdisciplinary Commission for Valuing Good Community Practices

We propose the establishment of an international Commission to identify, reward and network good environmental practices promoted by local communities, civic movements and ecumenical and interfaith organizations. These experiences, often invisible in global decision-making processes, represent essential social and cultural capital for the implementation of the Paris Agreement and the SDGs. To value them means to strengthen multi-level cooperation and to promote bottom-up innovation.

2. Establish an Ethical-Relational Observatory for Climate Justice

We propose the establishment of an Ethical-Relational Observatory that integrates the Global Stocktake with qualitative indicators on equity, participation, human impact and intercultural relations. This body can support policymakers in assessing climate policy effectiveness not only in terms of emissions, but also through qualitative metrics on social cohesion and intergenerational justice.

3. Promote Workshops for Dialogue and Ecological Reconciliation

We suggest creating permanent spaces for ecumenical, interfaith and intercultural dialogue in the territories most vulnerable to climate impacts. These workshops can contribute to the prevention of environmental conflicts, the rebuilding of trust and the promotion of climate peace.

4. Incorporate 'Care' as a Guiding Principle in Public Policies

We propose that care, understood as attention, listening, reciprocity and co-responsibility, becomes an explicit criterion for evaluating climate and social policies. Including care alongside efficiency and equity reinforces the human dimension of the ecological transition.

5. Education and communication for ecological transformation

We suggest the adoption of educational programs that integrate scientific knowledge, ethical values and the spiritual dimension of ecology. We also propose the establishment of an international network of positive communication, which collects and shares stories of environmental regeneration and social cohesion. This would involve an innovative techno-relational communication strategy to counter disaster narratives and promote shared future visions.

6. Promote an International Pact for Shared Sobriety and Gratuitousness

We propose the recognition of shared sobriety as a strategic lever for reducing emissions and achieving climate justice. A Multilateral Pact for Sobriety could foster models of responsible consumption and strengthen social trust.

7. Foster Glocal Alliances between Science, Spirituality and Community

We propose the establishment of glocal cooperation platforms that combine scientific research, spiritual traditions and community innovation. Culture and creativity can generate sustainable and inclusive solutions.

8. Promote 'Relational Conversion' as a Paradigm of Change

In addition to the technological transition, it is urgent to promote a relational transition: from the logic of domination to the logic of reciprocity and communion.

9. Include Spiritual and Community Impact in the Indicators of Sustainability

We invite the development of assessment methods that alongside environmental and economic data also include the spiritual and relational impact of climate projects.

10. Recognize "Love" as an Economic Category for a Just Transition

We propose that love, understood as an operating principle of solidarity, equity and co-responsibility, be recognized as an economic and political category.
